Happy Spring! Fourth graders traveled to Concord, NH and visited the NH Supreme Court and the State House. They were able to talk with Representative Jim Devine and Justice Hicks. The trip aids in the students' understanding of the three branches of government as we begin our study of state and national government.

All students completed the NWEA state assessments for Reading, Language, and Mathematics.

Classes have completed Unit 5 and read many stories of adventures by land, air, and water. Students are reading for pleasure and continue to show growth by using several reading strategies successfully.

Students wrote a persuasive piece applying the Six Traits of Writing in response to the unit prompt. They needed to convince a teacher of a field trip the class should go on next. They had some great ideas.

During April, the fourth grade classes developed their understanding and use of fractions and probability in math. They also wrapped up the erosion unit in Science. Students traveled to each fourth grade classroom to experiment with a different erosion concept.

Hopefully students and their families will have a restful vacation April 22-26th as fourth graders will participate in the Science NECAPS testing in early May.

Grade 5 News

We are several lessons into our D.A.R.E. program with Sgt. Aurie Roy of the Sandown Police Department. Students are learning the critical skills they need to make healthy and safe choices as they approach their adolescent years. Please take some time to talk to your child about these skills.

In math, we have been busy working on fractions and have expanded our knowledge to include



addition and subtraction of fractions and mixed numbers with different denominators. Students have been, or soon will be, introduced to the multiplication of fractions and mixed numbers. Once again, students quickly notice the importance of knowing their multiplication facts when working with fractions. Please help support your child's success in math by continuing to review multiplication facts at home.

In social studies, we have been learning about the settling of the early American colonies. This will be followed by learning about the causes of the American Revolution. And finally, our studies of early colonial history will be complete with a field trip to the Freedom Trail on May 30th. This is always a popular trip with adults and students alike!

Speech and Language News



May is Better Speech and Hearing Month. Seems these days, everyone is listening to iPods, MP3, and other enjoyable listening devices. Over the years, as these have become more popular, professionals have seen an increase in hearing loss in younger people. When your children are listening to these devices, please keep in mind the duration and the loudness level. It can prevent future hearing loss.

Hearing is measured in decibel (dB) levels. Normal hearing is between 0 – 20 dB. To make some comparisons, here are some everyday dB levels:

Whisper: 30 dB Normal talking: 40-50 dB Classroom noise: 60 dB Plane: 130 dB Rock concert: 140 dB

So here is a handy "rule of thumb" to listen to iPods and MP3 players: 60 X 60 rule. Listen to your iPod for no longer than 60 minutes at a 60 dB level. The 60 dB level is not on the iPod, but if you listen, you can regulate the volume until it is about conversational level. Take care of your hearing!

If you didn't have the opportunity to attend one of their concerts, this is a great opportunity to hear how musical our singers are.


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Band News

Congratulations to our Sandown Central **Destination ImagiNation** team!


We are so excited about our Destination Imagination teams. Sandown Central's DI team of Grace Duff, Emma Antkowiak, Madeline Zambrowicz, Ben Dalphond, Eve Harnois, Eli Duff, Mason Landry and Kaitlyn Coombs scored in first place in the Kingston Region for their challenge at the regional competition! The team competed in the In Disguise challenge. This result meant the team qualified for the State Competition later in March for a chance to go to Tennessee for the global competition.

We also had a team compete in the Nashua Regional competition. This team scored fourth in their challenge, culminating hours upon hours of hard work and team building. This group of Sierra Goodwin, Phoebe West Geary, Rebekah Gore, Madison Takesian, Rachel Gore, Emma Hill, built up a great team, we will be sad to see them go.

At these events, that involved more than 1,200 students from the region, the teams competed in a team challenge and an instant challenge then anxiously awaited the results at the conclusion of the event. For the team challenge the teams had to present a story about a character in disguise without using any words. The sound effects were created by the teams and the challenge also required a mask to transform. Our teams did this using LED lights (along with some magical healing power) for one team and the other had a mask that split open to reveal a police officer undercover. For the instant challenge, the teams were presented with a problem, that they had not seen previously, a challenge that remains a secret. What we do know is that the students had to work together and think on their feet, something these groups do very well.

At the State Tournament, our team placed fourth, just missing the trip to Globals (the top two teams are selected). Congratulations to both teams and a huge thank you to all the parents that helped to make this happen. From volunteering to appraising, gathering supplies and transporting the kids from the meetings, it takes lots of cooperation and dedication to make this work.
